is proving to be unstoppable, becoming the longest-tracked

tiger shark ever!

Andy was tagged four years ago in Bermuda by scientists from Nova Southeastern Úniversity's Guy Harvey Research Institute (GHRI) in the US. The voracious hunter has since travelled nearly 60.890km off the east coast of the US and around **Bermuda**, the **Bahamas** and Turks and Caicos.

After travelling for more than **1,240** days, the shark shows no sign of slowing down! Tracking data from Andy and other tagged sharks will help scientists to study **sharks'** migration patterns between summer and winter.

AUSSIE TEEN ADVENTURER!

Melbourne teenager Jade Hameister has become the world's youngest person and the first Australian woman to ski solo from the coast of Antarctica to the South Pole!

The 16-year-old's epic 37-day journey also set three other world records – Jade has become the first

woman in history to set a new route to the **South Pole** unsupported and unassisted, the youngest person to ski to both Poles, and the youngest person to complete the Polar

Hat Trick travelling through the North Pole, South Pole, and the Greenland ice sheet. Wow!

Jade's snowy expedition saw her cover almost 600km across the 37 days in temperatures as low as -50°C with windchill.

Jade and her team named several features of the unexplored Kansas Glacier after Australian icons, including the Opera House Ridge and the Anzac Steps. What a story to tell friends at school!







A pet bird named **Harri** caused a flap when she escaped her home in **Brisbane** and landed on a **two-week luxury cruise ship** headed to New Zealand's South Island!

Kiwi authorities were concerned the eight-year-old galah – a rose-breasted cockatoo native only to Australia – was a biosecurity risk and carrying avian diseases that could potentially harm the local native bird population. So Harri was captured and secured in one of the ship's empty cabins until the ship returned to Brisbane. Not much of a holiday after all!



The Queen of England may be taking steps for Buckingham Palace to go plastic-free, but there's one entire Australian city aiming to reduce its plastic pollution footprint.

On 23 May, we celebrate and promote the protection of the habitats of turtles and tortoises around the world!

International Turtle Day recognises that some species of our shelled friends are nearly on the edge of **extinction** due to **environmental** hazards and issues with the **hunting** and **harvesting** of

their **eggs**.

Australia is home to 23 turtles and one of the country's **most** endangered species, the **western swamp** tortoise. They are tiny growing up to **15cm** and date back ago. Amazing!

Many people mistake species of freshwater: tortoises for turtles Tortoises **dwell on** land while turtles live in the water some or nearly all of the time. Sea turtles migrate long distances to **15-20 million years**: feed, often crossing entire oceans.
